HB 487 of the 130th GA required licensing boards to adopt a rule implementing the standards developed by the Ohio Youth Sports Concussion & Head Injury Return-to-Play Guidelines Committee. The Committee issued its final report in March 2015.

The rule states that an athletic trainer may assess and clear a youth to return to practice or competition if all of the following are met:

- 1) The assessment and clearance is done in collaboration/consultation/referral of a physician
- 2) The AT has completed education and training consistent with the Zurich Guidelines
- 3) The AT maintains competency through continuing education activities consistent with the Zurich Guidelines.

The rule also recommends that licensees complete a portion of their required CE activities focused on the items listed in the rule and use the medical clearance return to play form located at the Ohio Department of Health's website.

**Youth sports concussion and head injury assessment and clearance.**

(A) For purposes of this rule:

- (1) "Interscholastic athletics" means an interscholastic extracurricular activity that a school or school district sponsors or participates in that includes participants from more than one school or school district.
- (2) "Physician" means an individual authorized under Chapter 4731, of the Revised Code to practice medicine and surgery or osteopathic medicine and surgery.
- (3) "Youth" means an individual between the ages of four and nineteen who participated in a youth sports organization or interscholastic athletics and was removed from practice of competition under division (D) of section 313.539 of the Revised Code or division (D) of section 3707.511 of the Revised Code, based on exhibiting signs, symptoms, or behaviors consistent with having sustained a concussion or head injury while participating in practice or competition.
- (4) "Youth sports organization" has the same meaning as in section 3707.51 of the Revised Code and means a public or nonpublic entity that organizes an athletic activity in which the athletes are not more than nineteen years of age and are required to pay a fee to participate in the athletic activity or whose cost to participate is sponsored by a business or nonprofit organization.
- (5) "Zurich Guidelines" means the consensus statement on concussion in sport: the 4th international conference on concussion in sport held in Zurich, November 2012.

(B) An athletic trainer may assess and clear a youth to return to practice or competition if all of the following requirements are met:

- (1) Pursuant to sections 3313.539 and 3707.511 of the Revised Code, the assessment and clearance is done:
  - (a) In consultation with a physician;
  - (b) Pursuant to the referral of a physician;
  - (c) In collaboration with a physician; or
  - (d) Under the supervision of a physician.
- (2) The athletic trainer has completed education and training in the detection of concussions and/or sports and recreation-related traumatic brain injuries, the clinical features of concussions and/or sports and recreation-related traumatic brain injuries, assessment techniques, and the principles of safe return to play

protocols consistent with the Zurich Guidelines and/or nationally accepted standards and guidelines consistent with the Zurich Guidelines.

(3) The athletic trainer maintains competency through continuing education activities in the detection of concussions and/or sports and recreation-related traumatic brain injuries, the clinical features of concussions and/or sports and recreation-related traumatic brain injuries, assessment techniques, and the principles of safe return to play protocols consistent with the Zurich Guidelines and/or nationally accepted standards and guidelines consistent with the Zurich Guidelines.

(C) The athletic trainers section recommends that athletic trainers who assess and clear a youth to return to practice or competition in accordance with this rule do both of the following:

(1) Ensure that a portion of the required twenty-five contact hours of continuing education focus on the items listed in paragraphs (B)(2) and (B)(3) of this rule.

(2) Use the medical clearance to return to play after suspected concussion form located at <http://www.healthy.ohio.gov/vipp/concussion.aspx> (March 2015).

The Common Sense Initiative was established by Executive Order 2011-01K and placed within the Office of the Lieutenant Governor. In HB 143 of the 129th GA and HB 487 of the 130th GA, the Ohio General Assembly adopted laws governing return to play decisions for youth sports. As part of this process, section 3707.521 of the Revised Code was enacted. Under division (E) of this section, a licensing agency must adopt rules establishing standards that are equal to or stronger than the guidelines developed by the Ohio Youth Sports Concussion & Head Injury Return-to-Play Guidelines Committee if it seeks to have its licensees authorized to assess and clear athletes for return to practice or competition.

6. **How will the Agency measure the success of this regulation in terms of outputs and/or outcomes?**

Success will be measured by licensees safely making return to play decisions in accordance with the guidelines established by the Ohio Youth Sports Concussion & Head Injury Return-to-Play Guidelines Committee.

### **Development of the Regulation**

The content of the draft regulation was based on the information contained in the Final Guidelines Report issued by the Ohio Youth Sports Concussion & Head Injury Return-to-Play Guidelines Committee.

**8. What input was provided by the stakeholders, and how did that input affect the draft regulation being proposed by the Agency?**

The Ohio Youth Sports Concussion & Head Injury Return-to-Play Guidelines Committee published its final report in March 2015 following receipt and review of extensive testimony by experts who routinely treat youth sports concussions and head injuries. The Ohio Revised Code directs the Board to adopt rules by September 17, 2015, that implement the recommendations contained in the final report.

**9. What scientific data was used to develop the rule or the measurable outcomes of the rule? How does this data support the regulation being proposed?**

The Committee was made up of professional licensees with expertise in treating youth sports concussions and head injuries. The Committee heard extensive testimony while developing guidelines. The Committee relied upon and directed licensees to meet the “Zurich Guidelines” which is the “Consensus Statement on concussion in sport: the 4th International Conference on Concussion in Sport held in Zurich, November 2012.” The Board is incorporating the Zurich Guidelines by reference in the proposed rule.

**10. What alternative regulations (or specific provisions within the regulation) did the Agency consider, and why did it determine that these alternatives were not appropriate? If none, why didn’t the Agency consider regulatory alternatives?**

The Board did not consider alternative regulations because the statutory mandate required compliance with the specific and detailed minimum standards determined in the Final Guidelines Report of the Ohio Youth Sports Concussion & Head Injury Return-to-Play Guidelines Committee.

**11. Did the Agency specifically consider a performance-based regulation? Please explain. *Performance-based regulations define the required outcome, but don’t dictate the process the regulated stakeholders must use to achieve compliance.***

The Board did not consider performance-based regulations because the statutory mandate required compliance with the specific and detailed minimum standards determined in the Final Guidelines Report of the Ohio Youth Sports Concussion & Head Injury Return-to-Play Guidelines Committee.

**12. What measures did the Agency take to ensure that this regulation does not duplicate an existing Ohio regulation?**

The statutory mandate required compliance with the specific and detailed minimum standards determined in the Final Guidelines Report of the Ohio Youth Sports Concussion & Head Injury Return-to-Play Guidelines Committee. The Board will implement the regulations while using its website, email listserv, and social media to update and inform licensees and other stakeholders.

Licensed athletic trainers

Individuals are required to have a license and meet various conditions for licensure to provide youth concussion assessment and clearance. The rule recommends that a portion of the required continuing education be focused on youth concussion assessment and clearance.

The requirement to use a specific form developed by the Ohio Department of Health could create additional work that is not currently required by licensees.

The Ohio General Assembly determined that the established of these requirements were necessary to ensure public safety.

On behalf of Lt. Governor Mary Taylor, and pursuant to the authority granted to the Common Sense Initiative (CSI) Office under Ohio Revised Code (ORC) section 107.54, the CSI Office has reviewed the abovementioned administrative rule package and associated Business Impact Analysis (BIA). This memo represents the CSI Office's comments to the Agency as provided for in ORC 107.54.

**Analysis**

This rule package consists of three new rules proposed by the Ohio Occupational Therapy, Physical Therapy, & Athletic Trainers (OTPTAT) Board. The rule package was filed with the CSI Office on July 30, 2015 and the public comment period was held open until August 31, 2015. Six comments were received during this time. The proposed rules were submitted with individual BIAs but have been combined for the purpose of this recommendation.

The proposed rules outline youth concussion assessment and clearance guidelines recommended by the Ohio Youth Sports Concussion & Head Injury Return to Play Guidelines Committee. The Committee was made up of professional licensees with expertise in treating youth sports concussions and head injuries. The Committee also relied upon and directed licensees to meet the "Zurich Guidelines" which is the international consensus statement on concussions in sports. The rules explain that athletic trainers, physical therapists, and occupational therapists may assess and clear youth athletes provided they consult with a physician and have received training in the area of concussion management. The rules recommend that athletic trainers, physical therapists, and occupational therapists maintain a level of continuing education in the field of concussion management.

While the rules do require a certain level of education and training in detecting concussions or recreation-related traumatic brain injuries; they are required by House Bill 487 of the 130<sup>th</sup> General Assembly. Most of the comments received were requesting clarification. One comment that was received, though, questioned the continuing education recommendation. The Board explained that continuing education in the field of concussion management is recommended but not required. Therefore, the CSI Office has determined the purpose of the rules is justified.

### **Recommendations**

For the reasons discussed above, the CSI Office does not have any recommendations for this rule package.

### **Conclusion**

Based on the above comments, the CSI Office concludes that the Board should proceed with the formal filing of this rule package with the Joint Committee on Agency Rule Review.
